This is the photo album published by the Union of Angola Veterans *From the Past to Nowadays*. It is composed of two parts: one is devoted to the history and events in Angola in 1970–90ies which our countrymen were part of, the second speaks of the present.

More than forty years have passed since many of the presented retro photographs had been first published. Those are not just images from the previous century, those are pictures of a different epoch. At that time many Soviet citizens, wherever they may be living – European part of Russia, Ukraine, Siberia or Far East – were the children of their times and country, and nearly all were internationally-minded people. That was the way we were brought up... We strongly believed in the ideals of justice, equality and fraternity, and many of us were ready, if called upon by the national leaders, to rush to the world's end to protect or help anyone in need, to restore justice usurped by the enemy.

This is what happened in Angola. No sooner the country had been born and declared its independence Angola became a victim of an armed aggression by the Republic of Zaire and South Africa which illegally occupied neighboring Namibia. At the request of the MPLA party which came to power in Angola the Soviet Union and Cuba sent its citizens to the country to help Angolans in repelling the armed aggression and building up of a new army, in restoring national economy devastated by the war. Our specialists detailed to Angola also rendered assistance to SWAPO fighters from Namibia and activists of the African National Congress from South Africa who found refuge in Angola - subject to SA harassment and oppression because of their struggle against apartheid, for freedom and independence of their countries.



Carrying out their service and internationalist duty, our military advisers, specialists and interpreters were part of combat units of the Angolan army and SWAPO armed units. They both trained soldiers and often directly participated in combat operations fighting shoulder-to-shoulder with Angolan, Cuban and Namibian combatants. Together with the Angolans our civil specialists were building power stations, houses, bridges, roads, giving medical assistance to people, participating in restoration of the fishing fleet, mastering the fundamentals of government administration.

Over the years of cooperation between the USSR/Russia and Angola (1975–1992) about 100 thousand Soviet and Russian citizens came to work in Angola. They accomplished their service and internationalist duty with flying colors. Many of them sincerely gave their hearts to this country and its people and continue to maintain close ties with Angola till now.

A public organization of the participants of international assistance to the Republic of Angola – the Union of Angola Veterans – was established in Russia in 2004. It was founded by activists who never sought any personal benefits. Those were the people who considered their work in Angola to be a personal human mission. Till nowadays this understanding allows to actively employ the potential of Union members in performing one of the key provisions of the Union's Statute: to contribute to the development of public, cultural and economic relations with the Republic of Angola. The second part of the album is devoted to those efforts.

The Union of Angola Veterans is based on the membership of all categories of specialists engaged in international assistance, participants of combat operations in that number. It incorporates retired servicemen – military advisers and interpreters – and civilians – diplomats of all ranks, bridge builders, medical

doctors, pilots, fishermen, agriculturists, civil engineers, geologists and representatives of other professions.

The Angolans very well remember those who helped the young republic to survive and win under pressure of systematic aggressions of South Africa where the white authorities pursued the inhuman policy of apartheid. When meeting a delegation of the Russian Union of Angola Veterans in November 2015 future President of the Republic of Angola, at that time Minister of Defense, João Lourenço explicitly described the importance of Angolan-Soviet relations to Angola and the role of Soviet and Russian military and civil specialists.

"Today we welcome Russian war veterans. I want to emphasize strongly that they are not veterans of their own war but specifically our war, the war for national liberation and sovereignty of Angola, and we are sincerely grateful for that. Today Angola attaches special importance to its relations with Russia, the successor of the USSR, with the country which offered invaluable support in winning our independence in November 1975 and then rendered vast assistance in our struggle against Zairean invaders and aggressors of South African apartheid. Eventually, with this assistance we managed to defeat the SA Army though at that time it was pronounced "the invincible". I can't find words to express my gratitude. Due to the assistance of the Soviet Union and Russia Angola managed to overcome the subsequent internal military conflict. Today we firmly stand on our both feet, not in the least due to your assistance both in the past and at present".

The photo album of the Russian Union of Angola Veterans *From the Past to Nowadays* contains more than two hundred fifty unique photographs illustrating both the efforts of Soviet and Russian specialists in Angola in 1970–90ies and images showing current activities of the Union.

Defending their Motherland "in the far reaches", in 1975–1992 on the invitation of the sovereign government several dozens thousand military advisers, specialists and interpreters, naval mariners and military pilots were stationed in Angola. Thousands of civil specialists – medical doctors, civil engineers, surveyors, teachers, fishermen, agriculturists, bridge-builders and representatives of other professions helped to restore civil infrastructure and build new industrial enterprises.

In 1975–1991 the 10th Chief Department of the General Staff alone sent about 12 thousand Soviet servicemen (among them 107 generals and admirals, 7 211 officers, more than 3.5 thousand WOs, privates and civilian employees of the Soviet Army and Navy) to help Angola in building up its national army and repelling outside aggression. All in all about 40 thousand servicemen were sent on a mission to Angola during the aforementioned period who helped in shaping the national army of Angola and armed forces of SWAPO (PLAN) and military wing of the ANC. Among them 834 servicemen were decorated with the state awards of the USSR for their military service in Angola, including those decorated with state orders – 580 servicemen, 274 were decorated with state medals.

The scale of presence of civil specialists in Angola is also impressive: in the mid-80ies the Trade Representative of the USSR in Angola instantaneously employed about three thousand experts. The spectrum of the duties of specialists dispatched to Angola was really vast. They assisted in creating a national system of health care and education, transportation and housing infrastructure, together with the Angolans restored merchant navy and fishing fleet, worked as rank-and-file doctors in hospitals and clinics, repaired Soviet aircraft and motor vehicles, restored bridges destroyed by South African troops.

A special mission was assigned to the Navy mariners. The ships of the Soviet Navy stationed at the shores of Angola carried out both their duty of military service in the interests of the country and protected our merchant fleet, escorted heavy-lift cargo ships with important goods and war materials forwarded from the Soviet Union and Cuba to Angola and other countries. Besides, those combat ships were commissioned to support the MPLA

government in case of a crisis and evacuation of Soviet citizens or a threat to the lives of our compatriots. In 1975–76 ships of the Soviet Navy escorted and protected Soviet and Cuban vessels carrying troops and war equipment from Cuba to assist the MPLA movement and Angolan government in repelling the Zairean and SA aggression (Cuban operation "Carlota"). All Soviet combat ship commanders were assigned a mission of counter sabotage, protection and defense of Soviet fishing vessels both at sea and during high sea fishing, as well as moorage in Angolan seaports.

Pilots of the Air Force were also of great help. Between 1976–1990 Soviet An-12 and Il-76 military cargo aircraft organic to the CMA's air wing were the tip of the military spear of Angolan AF transport aviation. They ensured both transportation of Soviet military personnel and carried out a considerable part of cargo delivery to the Angolan government forces (FAPLA) and Cuban troops.

Soviet military advisers and specialists taught Angolan commanders to plan and conduct the battle both in the offensive and defense, proper escort of cargo convoys, minefield laying and demining, conduct of reconnaissance, adequate maintenance of combat equipment. They taught their craft to pilots, tank-men and naval mariners. Our specialists rendered invaluable assistance in repair and maintenance of Soviet war equipment. Many advisers often became number-two (assistant) members of the crew of Angolan commanders, their "shadow" of sorts. At the time of joint combat operations they had to take assault rifles and machine guns in their hands, drive APCs and handle control levers of tanks, operate fire control consoles of missile and AA means.

Those were true military professionals who contributed much to the construction of Angolan Armed Forces. The fact that since mid-80ies the Angolan Army has begun "to cope" with the most combat-effective army in Africa, South African Defence Force, practically on an equal footing was an outstanding achievement of thousands of Soviet officers and generals who worked in Angola.






























The Russian Union of Angola Veterans actively works in the framework of the RF Law "On Public Associations". Before all, the Union is designed to support internationalist and patriotic upbringing of Russian citizens, promote development of public, cultural, economic and military ties with the Republic of Angola, as well as to preserve the true story of internationalist assistance to Angola in 1975-1992 rendered by Russian and former USSR citizens to be retold to future generations. Those efforts of the Union are manifold. Among them are: organization of public exhibitions and conferences, commemorative and memorial events, meetings of the veterans with Russian youth, Angolan students and cadets studying in Russian institutions, campaign-motor rallies. The Union also shapes and equips museums and displays, undertakes publications in the media, publication and distribution at home and abroad of books, brochures, booklets and documentaries showing how Russians and former Soviet citizens accomplished their internationalist and service duty in Angola in 1975–1992. Still another component is celebration of the annual Day of Angola Veterans (November 16), decoration of the veterans with Union's medals and other events.

One of the dynamic guidelines of the Russian Union of Angola Veterans are the activities in the framework of public (or people's) diplomacy. As it is known, before all the term implies active unofficial contacts of common people and public organizations. Such contacts contribute to the improvement of relations, mutually beneficial cooperation, better understanding of culture, history, traditions and specific features of everyday life of different countries. The Union of Angola Veterans has a vast capability to perform this job based on wide experience of its members to socialize with Angolans acquired at the time of their work in the country.

Members of the Union united into Moscow (central) and seventeen regional organizations (Altai Territory, Vologda Region, Vladivostok, Kaliningrad, Kirov Region, City of Kolomna, St. Petersburg, Leningrad and Novosibirsk Regions, Republic of Mordovia, Tver, Tula, Republic of Crimea and the City of Sevastopol, Saratov, Syzran and Yaroslavl Region) actively meet with Angolan students and cadets studying in

Russia, Angolan delegations visiting our country, and conduct meetings when visiting Angola and Cuba.

Russian Foreign Minister S. Lavrov highly praised the contribution of Union members into public diplomacy. In his address to the readers of the book (*We Carrieed Out Our Duty. Angola: 1975–1992*) published by the Union he noted: "A special role in building trust and mutual understanding between the two nations belong to public diplomacy. A significant contribution into joint efforts is made by the Russian Union of Angola Veterans which upholds close contacts with partner organizations. It is gratifying to know that our Angolan and Cuban friends take part in its activities".



As a result of lengthy consultations and talks with Angolan officials, numerous friendly meetings and discussions with our Angolan comrades-in-arms and war veterans we managed to reach an agreement on erecting a monument. On March 5, 2018 the official opening ceremony of the memorial stone was held in the Angolan capital on the premises of the Russian Embassy school. The monument carries a plaque with the inscription in Russian and Portuguese: "In commemoration of those who fought for independent Angola. To the Russians who carried out their internationalist duty".

Photographs presented in the second part of the album show this milestone event as well as dozens of other events in the life of the Russian Union of Angola Veterans, describe its active and fruitful efforts, and purposeful onward movement.

The strategic mission of the Russian Union of Angola Veterans is to preserve, protect and circulate the live MEMORY of the past based on true and actual knowledge of history, to help understand the importance and sustainability of cooperation with the country which became free and independent with the help of the USSR and Russia.







Reference

- 1 "To Defenders of Cuito Cuanavale" a memorial exhibition complex built in the 2000ies in the Angolan village of Cuito Cuanavale to commemorate the well-known Battle for Cuito Cuanavale 1987–1988 which stopped the advance of South African apartheid regime troops into the heart of Angola. The victory of Angolan-Cuban troops in the battle played a decisive role in liberating all territories occupied by South Africa and granting independence to Namibia.
- 2 UNITA National Union for the Total Independence of Angola a nationalist movement of Angola based on tribal principles, in 1975–2002 fought against MPLA and FAPLA, was strongly supported by the USA and some Western countries. In 2002 after the death of its intractable leader J. Savimbi, UNITA signed a ceasefire agreement with the government of Angola and became a legal political opposition party. UNITA has its faction in the country's parliament.
- FAPLA National Front for the Liberation of Angola (Forças Armadas Populares de Libertacão de Angola), the armed wing of MPLA, the army founded on August 1, 1974 on the basis of MPLA guerrilla detachments. On October 9, 1991 as a result of the reorganization and partial merger with UNITA armed forces were transformed into depoliticized armed forces of Angola. (FAA, Forças Armadas Angolanas).
 MPLA Popular Movement for the Liberation of Angola. Was later transformed into the Labor Party, Angola's political party, conducted national-liberation war against Portuguese colonizers. Its leadership was most consistent in the liberation of the country from colonial dependency through armed struggle, proclamation of national independence, building up a just society, free from racial discrimination and social exploitation in a united, independent country. It was guided by Marxist values and relied on the assistance of socialist countries and progressive representatives of liberated third world countries. On behalf of the Angolan people the MPLA proclaimed the country's independence on November 11, 1975 and since then has been the ruling party.
- 4 Chief Military Adviser position created by the USSR Ministry of Defense in foreign countries which received comprehensive military aid from the Soviet Union. At the same time this person was chief of the group of Soviet military specialists in the country. In Angola these positions were occupied at different times by: Maj Gen I. F. Ponomarenko (1976–1977); Lt Gen V. V. Shakhnovich (1977–1980); Lt Gen G. S. Petrovsky (1980–1982); Col Gen K. Ya. Kurochkin (1982–1985); Lt Gen Kuzmenko (1985–1987); Lt Gen P.I. Gusev(1987–1990); Maj Gen S. A. Surodeyev (from April to November 1990); Lt Gen V. N. Belyaev (acting chief military adviser from November 1990 to February 1991). From 1991 the position of chief military adviser in Angola was called "Chief Military Consultant of Angola's Ministry of Defense". In 1991–1993 it was held by Lt Gen V. M. Lebedev.
- 5 BDK (Russian abbreviation) Large Landing Ship.
- SWAPO South West Africa People's Organization, a military and political movement struggling for the liberation of Namibia. By agreement with the government of independent Angola in 1977–1990 its military bases and training centers were stationed in its territory. Since 1991 has been in power in independent Namibia.
- 7 Up to the end of the 1980ies in Angola the air wing of the Chief military adviser included about 12 turboprop An-12 planes which later were replaced with turbojet II-76 military cargo planes. With Aeroflot identification marks on board they transported cargo and personnel in the interests of Soviet military specialists, FAPLA and Cuban troops. The first An-12 planes of the air wing started their operations in Angola from 1976 and by the end of the 80ies about twenty military and transport planes manned by Soviet crews works in the country.

- 9 The USSR Navy 30th Operations Brigade a task force of the Soviet Navy set up in the 70–80ies from the group of surface ships, submarines and auxiliary vessels of the Northern, Baltic and Black Sea fleets operating in the Atlantic. The main bases were Conakri (Guinea Republic) and Luanda, the port of the capital of Angola. The brigade's operating support in Luanda was rendered by a specially created 877th Naval Facility with units on Angolan Naval and Air Force bases. Every year the Naval Facility in Luanda served up to 20 visiting surface and fleet-support ships, about two or three submarines (including nuclear powered), received, served and let out up to 50 combat reconnaissance planes Tu-95RTs of marine aviation and An-12 and Il-76 tactical support planes. The Headquarters of the 30th Brigade as well as those of the 5th Operations Squadron were based in the Mediterranean on the ships which were under the command of the 30th Brigade for the period of operational service. The 30th Brigade was under the direct command of the USSR Navy General Staff.
- SVS (Russian abbreviation) Soviet military specialists, SVSiS (Russian abbreviation) Soviet military specialists and advisers. Abbreviations used by the 10th Chief Directorate of the USSR General Staff in relation to Soviet military specialists stationed abroad to work in the armies of developing countries.
- 11 Long-range marine reconnaissance plane Tu-95RTs was at the time one of the main aircraft for detecting submarines and US aircraft carriers in the world ocean. On the Atlantic theatre these tasks were the responsibility of the personnel of the 392th Separate Long-Range Reconnaissance Aviation Regiment whose crews in the 70–80ies made regular reconnaissance flights on Tu-95RTs using airfields of Havana, Conakri and Luanda for stopovers.
- 12 "Sovispan" a joint Soviet-Spanish trade and procurement company with the headquarters on the Canary Islands (Las-Palmas). It supplied the Soviet military advisers abroad and crews of Soviet combat and auxiliary vessels with food and consumer goods.

- Joáo Lourenço, future President of Angola (elected in 2017), studied in Moscow at the Lenin Military Political Academy from 1978 to 1982, defended a dissertation in history. As of January 1, 1995 military higher schools of the USSR and Russia trained 6985 qualified Angolan servicemen: among them 3258 men for the army, for anti-aircraft personnel – 1084, for the air force – 1310 specialists, for the navy 591, and 104 logisticians and 638 specialists in other fields.
- 14 On August 27, 1981 during yet another invasion of South African troops into the southern districts of Angola (Operation "Protea") Soviet warrant officer Nikolai Pestretsov was taken prisoner by the soldiers of the "Buffalo" battalion spending one and a half years in captivity. Pestretsov had been sent to Angola as a specialist in motor vehicles at the 11th Angolan Infantry Brigade defending Onjiva (Ongiva). South African mechanized units surrounded Onjiva. As a result of the battle in August 1981 four Soviet citizens were killed by South Africans: adviser of the brigade's chief of artillery Lt Col Yevgeny Kireyev, his wife Lidia Kireyeva, adviser of the brigade's political officer Lt Col Josif Vazhnik and N. Pestretsov's wife Galina Pestretsova. Pestretsov was freed only in November 1982 with two other Soviet citizens captured by the UNITA Kamil Mollayev and Ivan Thernetsky as a result of an exchange for the South Africans captured in Angola.
- 15 PLAN armed forces (army) set up by SWAPO with the help of Soviet military advisers and specialists. In Angola three PLAN brigades were organized, trained and armed with Soviet weapons. They later formed a nucleus for creating armed forces of independent Namibia. In the 70–80ies PLAN units fought on the territory of South West Africa (Namibia) against South African occupational forces and also took part in FAPLA combat operations against the UNITA armed opposition inside Angola.
- After K. Kurochkin had completed his mission to Angola as the Chief Military Advisor he continued to supervise Angolan affairs in the USSR Ministry of Defense visiting Angola several times as head of working

groups of the General Staff in order to render assistance to the Angolan side. In 1987 when the situation in Angola deteriorated the Cuban leader F. Castro invited K. Kurochkin to Havana to discuss the coordination of Cuban and Soviet sides in the battle of Cuito Cuanavale in Angola.

- 17 Cuban pilots Lt Col Manuel Rojas Garcia and Capt Ramon Quesada Aguilara who flew MIG-21UM training plane were shot down on October 28, 1987 by the UNITA surface-to-air missile. They were captured by the UNITA militants who subsequently used them for propaganda purposes. The pilots were released as a result of peaceful negotiations in August 24, 1988. Manuel Rojas Garcia later wrote a book about these events UNITA Prisoners in the End of the Earth which was published both in Spanish and Portuguese.
- 18 In the early hours of June 6, 1986 in the port of Namibe combat South African swimmers mined and exploded Soviet dry cargo ships *Kapitan Chirkov* (16000 tonnage) and *Kapitan Vislobokov* (12000 tonnage) which had delivered about 20,000 tons of weapons and ammunition for the Angolan army, SWAPO guerrillas and ANC, as well as the Cuban ship (6000 tonnage) *Habana* with the cargo of food and ammunition. Soviet vessels managed to retain buoyance, but on their underbodies activated mines were found. A group of combat swimmers of the Black Sea Navy Underwater Sabotage Group under Yuri Plyachenko, Capt 2nd rank, was brought to Namibe by a charter plane. Together with a group of frogmen of the ASW ship *Stroinyi* under the command of Sen Lt Maksim Ivanov they managed to remove the undetonated mines from the boards of Soviet ships and thus save them. As a result of that operation three officers from the Plyachenko group were awarded the Order of Red Star, the rest were decorated with the medals "For Distinguished Military Service". Maksim Ivanov who spent the total of 24 hours under water was too decorated with the Order of Red Star.
- 19 In August 1981 as a result of armed invasion of the South African troops into the southern districts of Angola were occupied the towns of Onjiva (Ongiva), Xangongo and Cahama. During this period South Africans killed four Soviet citizens and captured one.

- 20 On November 25, 1985 Soviet military transport plane An-12, side number 11747, from the 369th Military Transport Regiment of the USSR Air Force (permanent base Dzhankoy) flying under the "Aeroflot" flag was shot down in Angola in the area of Menongue. The missile was launched by the task force RECCES of South African special forces. Eight members of the crew were killed: Commander Capt Sergei Lukyanov, Sen Lt Viktor Osadchuk, Lt Vitaly Pshenyuk, warrant officer Sergei Grishenkov, Warrant Officer Vladimir Shibanov and translator, student of the Military Institute of Foreign Languages of the Ministry of Defense Sergei Sholmov. Among those killed on board there were four Soviet military advisers: Col Yevgeny Kandidatov, Lt Cols Alexander Martynov, Mikhail Zhernosek and Anatoly Perevertov as well as eight Angolan officers.
- 21 Chief Political Directorate of the Soviet Army and Navy.
- 22 FAPA Força Aêria Popular de Angola (Portuguese), the Angolan Air Force.
- 23 DAA Defesa Anti-Aêria (Portuguese), the Angolan Air Defense Forces.
- 24 MLRS multiple launch rocket system.
- 25 Four MLRS BM-21 "Grad" which played a decisive role in the MPLA's victory at the Battle of Quifangondo were brought from the USSR to the Congolese port Pointe Noire on military transport planes An-22 ("Antey") of the 12th Mginsk Military Transport Division. The flight and landing at Pointe Noire took place in extremely hard meteorological conditions, with limited airborne weight (short unpaved airstrip). Later on November 7, 1975 the systems were transported to Luanda from Pointe Noire and in the early hours of November 10 secretly delivered to Quifangondo.

- 26 FNLA the National Liberation Front of Angola, Angolan nationalist movement. Its predecessor the Union of Peoples of Northern Angola (UPNA) was founded by the representatives of protestant nobility of Bacongo, an African tribe (living by the way on the territory of modern Angola) as an ethnic, separatist organization whose primary goal was to unite the Angolan Bacongo around the idea of the recreation of "a great state of Congo". It took an active part in the war for independence and civil war in Angola. In the 70–80ies it fought against the MPLA and FAPLA, from 1992 the right political party. Traditionally supported by the Bacongo nationality and occupied conservative tribal positions.
- 27 The lost crew and the helicopter belonged to the Myachkovo Joint Squadron of the Moscow Civil Aviation Administration of the USSR, which worked in Angola under a contract with the Ministry of Geodesy and Cartography of Angola, performing topographic surveys. Four crew members, two members of the topographic party and the son of the party chief were killed in the crash. The lengthy search for the site of the crash failed to bring any results. For a long time the people on board were considered missing. It was only in January 1989 when the wreckage of the helicopter was discovered in a difficult-to-reach area 140 km north of Luanda. In May 1989, the remains of the killed Soviet citizens were transported to Moscow. The examination of the damage to the helicopter showed that it had been shot down from the ground by small arms. (Source: Order No. 200 of November 30, 1989 of the USSR Ministry of Civil Aviation).
- 28 In the 70–80ies over 20 warships were delivered from the USSR to Angola in order to set up national naval forces, among them: six 205ER missile boats, four 206 torpedo boats, three 771 medium landing ships, a 1400ME "Griff" border patrol boat, three 368P patrol boats, two 1398B "Aist" boats, as well as two 1258B minesweepers.
- 29 **Peter Nanyemba (1935–1983)** Commander of the People's Liberation Army of Namibia (PLAN) during the war of independence earlier had been known as a successful diplomat representing SWAPO in Botswana

- and Tanzania. In 1970 he was elected SWAPO's Secretary for Defence. In 1983 he died in a car accident in Angola. The SWAPO Field Hospital near the Angolan city of Lubango was named after him the Peter Nanyemba Military Hospital. National Hero of Namibia.
- 30 Operation "Carlota" transfer of Cuban troops to Angola to rebuff the external aggression and help the Angolan MPLA movement. Conducted in 1975–1976 at the request of MPLA leadership, it was retaliation by the MPLA and Cuba for the open military intervention of South Africa and Zaire in Angola. The transfer of troops and equipment from Cuba was carried out by Cuban transport vessels Vietnam Heroico, El Corals Islands and La Plata, Cuban Civil Aviation Bristol-Britannia planes as well as Soviet civilian ships and II-62 aircraft.
- 31 The Battle of Quifangondo (23.10–10.11, 1975) the major battle of the war for Angola's independence in which the MPLA armed detachments and Cuban internationalists defeated the troops of the FNLA and Zaire advancing on Luanda. The defeat of the armed opposition and foreign interventionists near Quifangondo helped the MPLA to retain control over Luanda and on the night of November 11, 1975, it proclaimed the independence of Angola. The battle got its name from the place of hostilities the Quifangondo settlement and area (another spelling is Kifangondo) a few kilometers north of Luanda near the Bengo River.
- 32 In November 2007, on the initiative of Vyacheslav Petrovich Kozlov, head of the Kolomna office of the Union of Angola Veterans, member of the Board of the Kolomna branch of the Moscow regional organization "The Moscow Region Invalids", veteran of the Afghanistan and Angola wars, a Grove of Memory as a symbol of friendship between the soldiers of Russia and Angola was planted near Kolomna, at the confluence of the Repinka River with the Kolomenka River. The first two pines were planted by Angola veterans V. P. Kozlov, V. A. Patrin., V. A. Bersenev and the commander of the artillery of the Angolan Armed Forces, graduate of the RF General Staff Academy Lt Gen Antonio José de Sousa Queiroz, who came

to visit them with his family. In 2018, a memorial stone with the inscription "Grove in Memory of Those Killed in Local Conflicts" was solemnly installed in the grove with the participation of local authorities. Memorial events and reunions of veterans are regularly held in the grove, floral tributes and wreaths are laid on the stone on holidays and memorable days.

- 33 Military Training and Research Center of the Air Force "Air Force Academy named after Professor N. Ye. Zhukovsky and Yu. A. Gagarin".
- 34 Joáo E. dos Santos "Liberdade" was appointed Minister of Defense and Veterans Affairs of Angola by Decree No. 26/20 of March 26, 2020 of the President of the Republic of Angola.
- 35 General Simão Carlitos Wala is a legendary figure in the modern history of Angola. He is known both in Angola and Russia as well as throughout the world as commander of the Angolan Armed Forces (FAA) operation codenamed "Kissonde" ("Ant"). In February 2002 this operation led to the elimination of General Jonas Malheiro Savimbi, the implacable leader of the armed Angolan opposition and head of UNITA and FALA (UNITA Armed Forces). During the FAA operation starting in 1999 and lasting for three years (codename "Restauração" ("Restoration"), Savimbi's troops were ousted from the provinces of Lunda-Norte and Lunda-Sul, Huambo, Bié, Malange and most of Moxico. The former main base and the UNITA "capital", Jamba, were also taken over. But the decisive blow to Savimbi was dealt by the 20th Brigade of the Angolan army under the command of General Wala. On February 22, 2002, the implacable leader of UNITA was overtaken, surrounded and killed in the province of Moxico near the Lungué Bungo (Lungwebungu) River by the brigade's special forces unit. After his death, the military organization UNITA began to fall apart like a "house of cards" and the war was practically over.
- 36 Military Academy of the RF Armed Forces General Staff.

- 37 The 392nd Separate Long-Range Reconnaissance Aviation Regiment of the Air Force of the Northern Fleet was based at the Kipelovo airfield (now Fedotovo, Vologda Region). It was from there that in the 70–80ies Tu-95RTs reconnaissance aircraft flew combat missions to Cuba and Angola.
- 38 During his visit to Cuba in February 2013 **the Russian Prime Minister Dmitry Medvedev** at the request of the Council of the Union presented Fidel Castro Ruz with the badge of the honorary member of the Union of Angola Veterans and the medal "For Internationalist Assistance to Angola".
- 39 Military transport aviation regiment.
- 40 In June 2016, during the visit by a group of Angola veterans to the Valaam Monastery's Temple of Military Memory, thanks to the efforts of Svetlana Polyakova, Union's coordinator of the project "Chronicle of Activities of Civilian Specialists-Internationalists in Angola", it was agreed that the monks would accept for "the eternal prayer" all those Soviet and Russian specialists and their spouses who were killed or died while performing their official and internationalist duty in Angola.
- 41 Higher military aviation school for pilots.
- 42 Barry Fowler, former captain of the South African Defence Force Medical Service, donated his military uniform in which he served in the South African units on the border of Namibia and Angola in the mid-80ies to the Museum of the Union of Angola Veterans.
- 43 Former commander of the 4th reconnaissance and sabotage detachment of the South African Defence Force (4 Recce) Douw Steyn visited Moscow in July 2016 on the occasion of the release of the documentary film Confessions of a Russian sailor. They wanted to blow me up. The film tells the story of Maksim Ivanov,

Russian naval mariner and Angola veteran, who in 1986 took part in the removal of mines from Soviet civilian ships *Kapitan Chirkov* and *Kapitan Vislobokov*. Douw Steyn who then fought on the South African side participated in this sabotage mining operation code-named "Drozdi." During the meeting in the Union of Angola Veterans, in addition to the magazines, Douw Steyn received a gift – the book by S. Kolomnin *We Have Carried Out Our Duty. Angola:* 1975–1992, some other publications of the Union and several unique photos from the Union's archives taken by Soviet military advisers depicting appalling results of the activities of South African Recces in Angola. The meeting turned out to be extremely productive as it helped clarify details of many acts of sabotage committed by South Africa in the territory of Angola in the 70ies and 80ies and countermeasures by FAPLA and the staff of Soviet military advisers in Angola.

- 44 ANC African National Congress of South Africa the oldest political organization of South African people (founded in 1912), acted in alliance with the Congress of South African Trade Unions (COSATU) and the South African Communist Party. At the end of the 20th century struggled for the elimination of the disgraceful system of apartheid, including by military force. The ANC operations on the territory of the country were illegal, with its training bases located abroad, in Angola among others. The ANC personnel and its military wing "Umkhontowesizwe" ("uMkontove Sizve", "The Spear of the Nation") in Angola were trained exclusively by Soviet military specialists.

- 47 Sergei Grigoriyev has been decorated with the badge "For Assistance to the Union of Angola Veterans".

 This badge is awarded for important personal contribution to the solution of tasks facing the organization.
